
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
Shocking Ash Tree Showdown

From the ring of the bell, the two giants locked horns, trading thunderous slams in a battle for dominance and the admiration of the beloved female.

The two warriors battled ferociously for nearly half an hour as they exhausted their immense strength. The predicted outcome showed that the Alpha had an 85% chance to win⁴, as this colossus was ready to employ his signature move. Using his tarsal claw to cling to the log, the Alpha was struggling to dislodge his slightly smaller opponent. This strategy is so rare we have only ever seen it once before, in a contest between the little stag beetles, *Dorcus rectus* back in 20138. Professionals have named this 'trimorphism', the occurrence of sexually competing males having three distinct morphs, as opposed to the usual two9. Last night was a huge day in beetle battle history, and coleopterists around the world will never forget the first sighting of our second ever Gamma male. By the time the Alpha and Beta released their grapple and realised what had happened, it was too late. A stunned silence fell over the fallen tree, quickly replaced by a roar of disbelief from the crowd. The two behemoths, still locked in frustration as the spotlight shifted to the puny Gamma male. Fans are left wondering: was this a preplanned stunt, or has the Gamma genuinely outsmarted the lucanid wrestling world?
